#### Dear Families,

This year, I believe your child will get the best instruction in math and literacy that we have ever offered. We have been working together as a staff for the past five years to ensure that our teachers raise the bar on what we expect students to know and be able to do. To do this, we've been using the Wisconsin standards for mathematics and English language arts along with the International Baccalaureate standards and practices framework.

Standards are a set of knowledge and skills that get kids ready for the next grade, for the college or career of their choice, and for the world beyond our doors. We've always had math and English standards in Wisconsin, but frankly, they have not been very high or very clear, and so we never spent much time talking about them. These standards are different.

This year, your child won't simply be memorizing times tables in mathematics; he/she will be able to explain the concept of multiplication, and will be able to apply this concept to real world scenarios. In English, your child will not simply be writing an opinion about a book; he/she will refer to evidence from that book to construct a viable argument that can be shared confidently with others.

We have spent time as a staff working on how to teach differently using our standards so that kids learn deeply, with better connections to the real world and to things kids actually care about. Hands on activities, problem-solving and creative thinking are priorities in our district, and we are excited about the ways we have worked to connect these priorities to literacy and math.

Green Lake teachers are teaching so that all our kids learn at higher levels, but they will also tailor instruction to meet your child's unique strengths and needs. If your child is struggling with a concept or skill, we will discover it faster than ever before with our new assessment system that will better measure what we are teaching and what students are learning. If the need arises, our teachers have the knowledge and training to help your child overcome a challenge quickly and move beyond it.

If you ever have questions about the way your student is learning, please reach out to us; part of teaching to ensure that every student learns deeply means we might use some strategies that are new to you, and we are happy to help you understand these strategies too.

I am excited for the literacy and math learning that will take place this year, and I want to thank you for partnering in your child's learning. Your support means the world to us. It is a privilege to educate all of our students, and one we work hard at every day.



The Green Lake School District, in partnership with the community, commits to an education of excellence by creating a safe environment that encourages mutual respect, enthusiasm for learning through personal attention, and integrated, challenging curriculum so that students can reach their full potential as positive members of our community and the world beyond the classroom.

One of the main features of the Green Lake School District is that its students connect to the community. The community reciprocates with great support and opportunities for students to explore. Students from the science classes are working with the Green Lake Association to do water sampling and tracking the data. It gives them hands-on experience and an awareness of the water quality issues facing our watershed.

This cooperation and communication has led to the Green Lake Association using the high school entrance as a rain garden demonstration site. The Association got a grant to have one designed and installed. The garden will be in a visible spot for the community to see, and a reminder to our students that we need to keep runoff out of the lake. Students will also be out working in the sight get their hands dirty in an earthy event. I hope that this garden will spark interest in developing more of them in every large building in our city. The project is just one example of the benefits of working together.

After the dust settles on the election coming in November, I would like to our state politicians work together on school funding. The use of property value to determine funding neglects districts like Green Lake where the average income doesn't match the average property value. The amount state aid received for 2014-2015 has dropped by 15%, and next year it looks like even less. Aid is one thing, but the ability to operate is another.

The Wisconsin Association of School Boards gets it. They are asking for the state to tie school revenue controls to the rate of inflation. Since the 2009-2010 the annual adjustments to the controls have not allowed schools to even minimally match inflation. The results of the restrictions are seen in the number of referendums being done for school operations.

The decrease in state aid combined with an enrollment less than projected has caused a slight increase to the tax levy of less than 1%. Also there was a drop in the District's equalized value so the mill rate will rise a small amount depending on where you live. This year's budget is balanced and will not have to dip into the fund balance which is very good news for our financial future. After the School Levy Tax Credit is applied there is even better news. Check the upper right hand corner of the property tax bill for a box that says "School taxes reduced by school levy tax credit". Based on the latest information, it reduces the actual property taxes paid by about \$1 per \$100,000 assessed value. This makes the Green Lake School District the best tax bargain in the area.

#### Notes from the Nurse:

We ask that if your child is not feeling well to consider keeping him/her at home. This information is to serve as an informational guideline in preventing the spread of communicable disease in school. If any of the following symptoms are noted, they should not be at school:

- A temperature of 100 degrees or more
- On antibiotics less than 24 hours
- A productive cough or continuous coughing
- Purulent (green, yellow, thick, or otherwise unusual) nasal or eye drainage
- Diarrhea or frequent stools
- Skin rashes/eruptions
- Red throat, swollen glands around jaws, ears, or neck
- Complaints of ear ache, severe stomach ache, sore throat, severe headache
- Nausea or vomiting (during the night or in the morning)
- Lethargy, complaints of muscular aches and pains
- Head or body lice

Students presenting any signs or symptoms mentioned above should remain home until they are symptom free for 24 hours. Our purpose is not only to protect all students, but also prevent students from returning to school with a decreased resistance to infections. Your cooperation in maintaining a healthy school environment for all students is appreciated.





# **Green Lake School District Rain Garden**

In October Stuart's Landscaping started excavating the site and laying the foundation necessary for a rain garden in front of the high school entrance of the school. Later, students installed plants, laid mulch, and received demonstrations about the concepts behind implementing rain gardens. A big thank you to Paul Meuer, Communications and Project Manager with the Green Lake Association, who was available to facilitate installation, and provide brief lectures regarding how rain gardens work, the biochemistry behind phytoremediation, and why they are important. Both Paul, and GLA Executive Director, Stephanie Prellwitz, were instrumental in allowing GLSD to receive the rain garden development. The project was part of the GLA's 'Urban Education Initiative', which was funded through a WDNR Lake Planning Grant. Thanks also, to Stuart's Landscaping and Garden Center, who generously donated all of the plant materials for this project. In addition, the GLA will be installing educational signage to describe more about how rain gardens work and to provide an educational resource that will be enjoyed for years to come.

## **Classrooms Get a STEM Makeover**

A project that was a year in the making and took over 4 months to complete has resulted in a brand new look to both high school science rooms, and has changed the old Technical Education classroom into a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) lab. The STEM lab includes a new teacher's office, a screen printing room, and a classroom with an ultra-modern look. The classroom was cleared of all the old clutter and outdated equipment and replaced with a newly surfaced wood floor, a painted cement floor, new paint on the ceiling and walls, a Smartboard, and stainless steel countertops and cabinets. Students felt very proud of the new classroom as they entered for the start of the school year. They now have comfortable office chairs to sit in and a less distracting room to learn in. The project is structurally complete, but will not be fully finished until later in the school year. Under the supervision of Mr. Jandrin, the students will be completing the project by re-doing the welding booths to make them safer and to give them an updated appeal. The school will also continue to update the equipment in the lab for safety purpose and so that instruction is on the cutting edge of technology. In the past year the Technical Education department has added screen printing equipment, a 3D printer, a saw stop table saw, and a CNC machine. Mr. Jandrin is hoping to add to this list in the near future.

The Biology lab received an upgrade to the classroom lab facilities, and a Smartboard was added to enhance student learning.

The Chemistry lab underwent a major remodel, including an extension of the classroom for additional lab space. A Smartboard was added along with some new lab tables, and the gas and water lines were updated.

The main purpose of the remodel was to increase instructional resources, update equipment and ensure safety in both the Technical Education and Chemistry labs. The district is proud to offer a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) approach to learning that is second to none. The school district will contact the parents of students in grades 4K-4 who do not have an older sibling to inform them of the emergency situations which require an early school dismissal. The school district will attempt to contact radio and television stations prior to 6:15 a.m. whenever school is canceled or the start of the school day is delayed.

- Radio stations which will broadcast information about the Green LakePublic Schools weather/emergency related schedule changes are WRPN (1600 AM) and WISS (102.3).
- Television stations which will broadcast the information are Green LakeCable 98, WLUK-TV, WMTV-TV, WGBA-TV, WFRV-TV, and WBAY-TV.

Please make note that anytime school is canceled or dismissed early due to weather, road conditions, or other emergencies, all after school activities, athletic practices and contests are also canceled.

Weather conditions may make school bus travel unsafe on some roads. Each bus driver has been given the authority to determine if a portion of his/her route is unsafe for travel due to road conditions.



The winter season has arrived! For the safety of our children, the elementary teachers have agreed on some winter recess attire rules. These rules must be followed by all children, or they will be required to spend the recess inside.

1. All children <u>must</u> have winter boots to play outside. Those without boots will have to stay in the "No Boot Zone".

2. All children grades 4K-3 <u>must</u> wear snow pants to go out in the snow. Children in these grades who have boots, but no snow pants will be required to stay on the blacktop.

3. Children in grades 4-6, snow pants are optional. Those without snow pants may not play in the snow.

4. Please help to make sure your child is wearing attire that they are able to independently put on and remove.
