From The Desk Of The Principal Gina Baxter



Igniting Sparks through the Primary Years Program!

Students start their Primary Years Program (PYP) education in 4K and complete it at the end of 6th grade. While on the PYP path, students travel through transdisciplinary units that are designed to nurture and develop them as caring, active participants in the journey of lifelong learning. Mila Chetto, a 7th grade student, shares her PYP experience about jiggers in Uganda.

A jigger starts out so small it is nearly invisible. It burrows into a person's skin and latches onto blood vessels. Within days the jigger swells to over **1000 times** the size it was while continuously laying eggs. Those eggs hatch, mature, and lead to an infestation. The results of jigger infestation are pain, itching, and infection. Children stop walking to school. Adults can't care for their families. The elderly become captive in their homes (Sole Hope, n.d.).

'In 2nd grade, I learned about Uganda and have been interested in it since then. So in 6th grade when I got to choose whatever I wanted to do for exhibition, I thought it would be good to do it on jiggers because it's a huge problem people in Uganda have to deal with. And then I found out that my aunt was working with a group called Sole Hope. This is a group that helps people with jiggers. This practically sealed the deal! At first I only knew about it by pictures but then I read about it and it was really interesting. Before exhibition, I had a jean drive because my aunt said that I could use old jeans to make shoes with them for the people in Uganda. I ended up with about 200 pairs of jeans. A regular pair of jeans can make about 4 shoes so it was very successful. Just last week I was asked to present about jiggers to the 2nd grade and I thought it ended very good. And today I was asked to present to the 6th graders. I'm starting to think about charging for my presentations, maybe \$1 per person. Just Kidding!' -Mila Chetto, 7th Grade GLSD Student

Could we please talk more and tech less?

As most of you have noticed while walking through the high school commons, heads are down and cellphones are out. This is not an unusual sight in other high schools I've been in and in coffee shops, restaurants, airports, malls, etc... throughout the world. Yes, some students are using their cellphone for educational purposes, and many are using it to socialize appropriately. My own children ask me to text, not call, because it is easier, and they are busy. I get it, however, watching this social phenomenon on a daily basis inspired me to do some research and this is what I found at : (www.talkmoretechless.com):

Did you know...

- 95% of American adults own a cellphone
- 80% of us have our phones with us for 22 hours a day
- Almost 50% of teens admit to texting while driving
- 95% of people are on technology an hour before bed
- 90% of 18-29 year olds sleep with their cellphones close by
- Most people check their cellphones every 10 minutes (150 times a day)

What is it doing to our mental health, our relationships and our productivity?

Evidence proves deteriorating relational communication is linked to excessive internet and cellphone use

- Excessive cellphone use in students causes lower GPA, higher anxiety and lower satisfaction with life
- Studies are linking technology to ADHD and other childhood development attention and behavioral issues
- 41% of gamers admit they play to escape their daily lives
- 7 out of 10 people report some level of anxiety when disconnected from their cellphone
- Many 13 year olds check their social media accounts 100 times a day due to these pressures:
 - -61% said they wanted to see if their online posts were getting "likes" or comments
 - -36% said they wanted to see if their friends were doing things without them
 - -21% said they wanted to make sure no one was saying mean things about them

What can we do differently to help our children?

- Model good cellphone behavior
- Establish rules:
 - -no cellphones during meals at home or in restaurants, increase family conversation
 - -no cellphones until homework and chores are done
 - -establish a time for cellphones to be turned off, no cellphones in the bedroom overnight
 - -establish family activities with a no cellphone rule
- Talk openly about social media and periodically check your child's phone

To do my part, I am planning to create "no cellphones allowed" tables in the high school commons and cafeteria. There are (believe it or not) students who want to put down their cellphones and talk face to face. It will be interesting to see what happens. I'll keep you posted.





<u>PRESIDENT'S REPORT:</u> Sue Sorenson reported on the CESA 6 meeting and reminded committee chairs that it is very important to keep scheduled meetings and keep meeting dates as consistent as possible.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Policy Committee should meet in January. We continue to meet with Steve LaValle and NEOLA. The first 2 sections are ready for the Policy Committee to review. The dates for the legislative breakfast were included on paperless for board members. Trailways conference will remain unchanged at this time. There had been discussion of dividing up conferences. There has been some interest at the elementary level in the wresting CO-OP. The Attorney has reviewed the warranty for the new floor. He had a couple questions. We have also received 2 grants, one grant is in the amount of \$4,950.00 for 2nd lunch program and the other grant is for \$6,100.00 for our after school tutoring program. These grants came from Green Lake County/Ripon Community Foundation.

BASKETBALL





Fermilab Visit

Seniors in the second year of IB Diploma Program physics, chemistry and biology left in the pre-dawn hours of December 13 to visit Fermilab. Students entered Tevatron, the retired particle accelerator, and saw some current research. They discussed quarks, leptons, force carriers and the Higgs Boson. They also discussed one physicist's path to working at Fermilab. Located in Batavia, Illinois, Fermilab is America's particle physics and accelerator laboratory. It employs people from all over the world in all areas of science, including physics, engineering and even prairie management and American bison care. A visit to Fermilab put particle physics and the amazing things that are currently being accomplished by science into perspective for students.
