"*Little Shop* is a campy, sci-fi blast," stated Mika Chetto, Green Lake School Drama Director. "It's like nothing we've ever done at Green Lake before. If you've seen either of the movies and *think* you know the show, you're in for a surprise!"

The Drama Department had a rough start this year when the fall production, which was originally scheduled to be Samuel French's *Grease*, had to be canceled. "There just were not enough males interested in participating to be able to cast the show," said Ms. Chetto. "We were leaning towards canceling the fall production all together, because all of our work over the summer was rendered useless."

"My daughter was extremely disappointed when word got around that the show was probably going to be canceled," said Green Lake parent Laurie Lettner. "So many of the other kids have their sports, but I know that for the artistic kids, this is the highlight of their year, and a very important part of their High School years."

The performance dates were reserved in the school calendar, every weekend after that was already booked, and the performance rights for *Grease* had already been paid for. In the limited time frame they had to work with, it seemed impossible to be able to pick a new show, get it approved and secure the performance rights, let alone cast it, draw up new set designs, acquire props, costumes and create a whole new rehearsal schedule. But in the end, the student's determination came through. "I told Ms. Chetto, forget *Grease*, let's just do something else!" stated Sam Hebbe, Green Lake Freshman. "The show must go on, right?" "I'll admit it, I turned on the tears," laughed Liza Lettner, sophomore.

After some fast finagling, Ms. Chetto was able to get the cost of *Grease* reimbursed to the school, and with the help of students and a few supportive parents, they began to pull everything together. "We started rehearsing before we even had scripts. The kids were singing the songs and running lines with YouTube videos. While we are definitely behind schedule, this has been the most dedicated cast I've ever worked with, and I have no doubts that they will be able to put on a fantastic performance!"

Little Shop of Horrors will be performed in the Green Lake School Gym on November 15th and 16th at 7:00pm and November 17th at 2:00pm. This show does contain some mild violence and scary themes, which may be unsuitable for children under the age of 10. 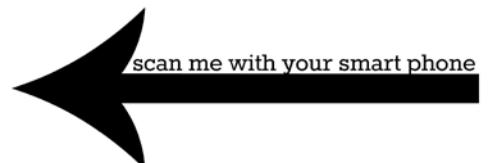
BONJOUR 4K

WKCE Testing Begins November 4th

Students in grades 3 and 4 will begin taking the state tests on Monday, November 4th. Students in grades 5, 6, 7, 8, and 10 will begin taking the state tests on Tuesday, November 5th. The testing schedule will conclude on Friday the 8th for grades 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7, and Friday, November 16th for grades 8 and 10. The differentiated test schedule for the various grades is mandated by the Department of Public Instruction. If your child is in grades 3, 5, 6, or 7, he/she will be tested in reading, language arts, and math. If your child is in grades 4, 8, or 10, he/she will be tested in reading, language arts, math, science and social studies.

During the first week of testing (Tuesday, Nov. 5- Friday, Nov. 8), middle and high school students will be on a two hour late start schedule.

Secondary students who are not testing (grades 9, 11, and 12) do not have to be in class until 10:00. During the first week, all students who are testing will be offered a breakfast bar or fruit and juice or milk between 7:45 and 8:00. **Testing will begin at 8:05 and end at 9:55; the regular school day will begin at 10:00. All middle and high school classes will be abbreviated; the school day will end at the regular time (3:15).**

Secondary students who are not testing the first week and ride the bus can come into the building and use the fitness center or library. Those areas will have adult supervision. Testing during the second week will be done in regular or content classes; a special schedule will not be necessary.

In an attempt to provide the best possible testing atmosphere, secondary grades will be divided into small groups with separate testing rooms. Each group will be limited to five students. No one will be allowed in the hallways during the testing time, and the bell system will be turned off.

All elementary students will be in their regular classrooms; those with no testing (grades 4K, K, 1st and 2nd) will start at 8:00, and students taking tests will start at 8:05 (after the breakfast). Mrs. Allen will be visiting classes before the testing begins to underline the importance of the exams. We appreciate your support of our efforts to improve our test scores.

Thank-you Parents

It is that time again.....WKCE State testing. The first week of November our students will be tested to find out how they measure up to other students in the state at their grade level. As reported in our 2012 results, the district exceeded expectations. I am so very proud of our students and their teachers for this accomplishment. However, they could not have done it without the support of their parents. Parents help to build the foundation by overseeing the development of basic skills. The district is also rated by the state on student engagement factors such as absenteeism and drop-out rate. Parents help by creating enthusiastic support for school, thus increasing high expectations to attend school and do well.

We all know that our students are not just test scores. More important are their abilities to communicate, collaborate, be creative and think critically. These are the skills they will take into their post-secondary classrooms and adult lives and at this point in time, are not on the state test. Students in Green Lake demonstrate what they know in a variety of ways: speaking, writing, group and individual research, hands-on projects and through art, music and movement. We know the test scores are important to the district, but we also know that our students are given countless opportunities to really show what they know in other ways.

Parents, please help your child perform well on the upcoming tests by making sure they have enough rest, have eaten breakfast and that they come to school with a positive attitude about taking the test. Our goal is to improve our 2012 accountability score!

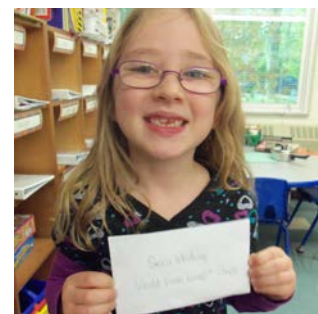


These photos show Cullen making his food choices, with Jack working behind the window. After making her selection, Mrs. Allen had her choices okayed by Siera, the food police officer.

The **Kindergarten kids** have been learning about choosing healthy foods. As an extension of what they are learning, they have been invited to go grocery shopping with their families and while shopping choose one item that they usually buy but that isn't really necessary for good health, such as chips, soda, cookies, etc. They are then asked to leave that food at the store, and instead of buying it, to put that amount of money in an envelope to bring to school. This money will then be collectively donated to Feed My Starving Children, an organization that creates chemically balanced meals designed to keep a child from starvation. Our donations will add up to help several children regain a healthy weight since one meal only costs 22 cents to make. If any of you would like to join the kindergarten kids in their initiative to make healthy choices and in the process help others, we would be happy to accept your donation towards Feed My Starving Children. ShoeBox Recycling



***Spread the message:
"Worn is not worn out."***

We are collaborating with ShoeBox Recycling to recycle shoes. Plus, for fun, every time we include a SoleMate note in a forty-pound box, we create something like the old 'message in a bottle,' only now the vessel will be a pair of shoes that we no longer wear.

This fundraising program is extremely flexible. A student who needs to fund raise for an overseas trip to France or Spain, for their service project or for advanced placement fees can adopt one or more boxes. We will also accumulate ShoeBox funds to purchase bicycle ambulances, which any remote African village can use to more quickly transport loved ones with medical emergencies to the nearest clinic.

We need your support. You can bring your shoes to room 311 anytime. Periodically, we will hold shoe-raisers during in-school and sporting events. Remember this fundraiser and never again throw away another pair of worn (but not worn out) shoes.

This program doesn't just keep shoes out of landfills. People all over the globe depend on second hand shoes:

- So they can attend school
- To protect against bacteria borne illness
- For job creation

Shoebox recycling will:

- Send us boxes to fill (we got 7 to begin with and we already have 2 full!)
- Pay for all shipping costs
- Give us tools to successful shoe drives
- Give us a chance to meet our SoleMates
- AND, they pay \$ 0.50 per pound for the good, reusable shoes that we collect! Each forty pound box will raise \$20!

COUNSELING CONNECTION BY KATIE LOEST, SCHOOL COUNSELOR

Hello Green Lake Families! The school year is well under way and is certainly flying by quickly. For me, it is hard to believe we are already approaching the end of first quarter. As we all know, with the end of a quarter, comes quarter grades and report cards. Report card grades are just one measure of academic success. Academic success is something that is defined differently by different individuals.

As a school counselor, a large portion of my job is to support students in ways that promote academic success. I spend a great deal of time talking with students about academic success measures, such as grades. I have run across a great article I would like to summarize and share with you.

This article is titled, "The Report Card Conversation" and is written by Neil McNerney, M.Ed., LPC. The author has worked several years as a school counselor, private counseling practitioner, and now a counselor educator on Virginia Tech's campus. Talking about Grades

Report cards can range from "good" to "bad" with everything in between. The conversations for each "type" of report card may look different, but in general:

Be sure to start with the positives first and then move on to the areas for improvement. Both positives and improvements need to have focus and this order sets the conversation up for success. It is also great to end the conversation on a good note, so loop back to the positives. In other words, make a compliment sandwich. Focus on hard work rather than on ability or intelligence. Focusing on hard work is something a child has more control over and is more likely to produce positive results than focusing on intelligence or factors outside of the student's control.

Don't let outside "excuses" side rail the conversation.

Come up with a specific plan for improvement or continuation of success. What EXACTLY is the student planning to do? What EXACTLY is the goal? How EXACTLY are we going to reach the goal?

Explore, setup, and follow through with consequences and incentives at home that are linked to grades and hard work in school.

Recognize that each child is different and avoid falling into the mindset that just because we struggled in a certain area, our children will naturally struggle in that same area -this is an excuse.

Encourage your children to have appropriate conversations with teachers regarding their grades, progress, and ways to improve. Role playing these conversations can help too.
